





ANNEXURE – 3 – 1 (Best practice)

Watershed management Program:

Aim:- To develop awareness for conservation of water.

Watershed management is the need of the hour not only for the soil conservation and ground water conservation, but also it has impact on nation economy and solution for employment problem in draught prone area. There are two critical factors, water and soil in such area main objective is to conserve the soil and water which creases vegetative growth.

The severity and intensity of the present drought in Marathwada is increasing day by day. Unlike 1972 drought, presently we have sufficient food grains but very little ground water and surface water. Acute shortage of drinking water and water for surviving standing crops are the major challenges. Today, because of deforestation there is no rain, the water table has gone down to 800 to 1000 ft. So we can create the awareness among the community in the adopted villages to recharge the water by way of Percolating pits, Rain Water Harvesting, trenching in the fields.

For this, NSS have a special role to play in engaged in Development work.

Our college organized following programs for orientation and awareness about watershed management programs.

1. Every year on 1st July, on the occasion of birth Anniversary of Late Vasant Rao Naik, Tree Plantation and Environment Awareness program is organized by College for student.
2. This year the National Service Scheme (NSS) unit of college organized special orientation on watershed management program under regular activities.
3. During Special Camping Program 125 National Service Scheme (NSS) Volunteers Worked for Soil Bandhara in village. They oriented and motivated the communities to involve themselves with NSS about importance of watershed management.
4. NSS volunteers worked for sock pits in village during camp.

The program was highly successful with the whole hearted participation by the villagers.

ANNEXURE – 3 – 2 (Best practice)

Competence Enhancing Curricular Strategy

Aim:- To provide demand based employability skills to the students through tripartite curricular structure.

National University Students' Skill Development (NUSSD) Programme, is a flagship program on skill development undertaken by Tata Institute of Social Sciences(TISS) in collaboration with Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports to enable graduating youths from underprivileged background to acquire employment oriented skills while pursuing their degree program.

A pan India program which was initiated in 2013 on pilot basis is being implemented in 35 colleges of 11 universities from 9 Indian states and aims to reach 50000+ students and more colleges by 2016.

Through the employment oriented courses meticulously designed by experts from academia and industry and cutting edge training methods, the program will transform the employment scenario in rural India by imparting career-oriented skills.

Spread across three academic years, courses under NUSSD are designed in an integrated framework that imparts demand based domain specific employability skills through class room and practical training along with essential skills such as English Communication, Computer skills, Financial Literacy, Leadership and Soft Skills etc. Learnt skills under the NUSSD program will be certified by School of Vocational Education, TISS and students after the successful completion of program will be awarded certificate/diploma in soft skills management or in the specified domain in which they have undergone training. The diploma/certificate will be awarded in addition to their regular degree they are pursuing and will add value to their degree by providing additional skills as well as will inculcate a sense of involvement in community development process.

Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University Aurangabad is selected from Maharashtra state for this course. Four colleges under Dr. B. A. M. U. Aurangabad involved under NUSSD on pilot basis for three years. **Vasantrao Naik Mahavidyalaya Aurangabad is one of college selected for implementation of NUSSD.** Head of Institution and Principal signed a **MOU** with Director TISS for implementation of NUSSD from academic year 2013-14 to 2015-16.

200 students were enrolled for the Foundation Course in the year 2013-2014 and 400 in 2014-2015. Though the attendance and number of students completing the course was very low.

Obstacle:- The course could not be run successfully due to the overlapping of teaching timings with the routine time table of the college.

Action Taken:- Proper slots in the regular college time table have been allotted for the course.
